

**Dear Parents and Carers** 

Now that the better weather has finally arrived, we are pleased to let you know that the children have been enjoying using the school playing field once again. We are already looking forward to our sports day and in the run up to this, the children will be practicing their sporting skills in a range of activities. For our Year 6 children, this has been a very important term as they completed their statutory end of Key Stage 2 assessments. These assessments are designed to find out what children know and remember from their entire time at primary school. We know how hard the children have worked in the run up to these and how much effort they put into them. We are very proud of the way in which they took responsibility for themselves and supported each other through any ups and downs. Now that these are over, we hope that they can look forward with excitement to their upcoming residential and end of term leaver's party.

An avid group of children have been helping Mr Evans with our planting beds that are now springing into life. The children cleared the beds and have planted honeysuckle, perennials, fuchsias, artichokes and beetroot, to name a few. The children have thoroughly enjoyed getting their hands dirty and contributing positively to our school environment.



Year 1 children enjoyed their local visit to a church this half term, where they learned about the functions of this type of building for those who are Christian as well as the community activities they support. The children learned about the different parts of the church and how these were used and also found out more about the role of christenings in the Christian faith.



A selection of children from Years 5 and 6 took part in a sports partnership netball match this half term, playing in nine matches against other local schools and winning three of these. Our children demonstrated excellent sportsmanship throughout each and every match. We were proud to have them representing our school.

#### **Nursery & Reception**



### Cubs

This term in Cubs our topic has been 'Under the Sea. The children have enjoyed spending time outside using the water tray and magnetic fishing rods to go fishing. Our favourite stories this term have been 'Barry the Fish with Fingers' by Sue Hendra and 'Shark in the Park' by Nick Sharratt. Cubs have enjoyed taking part in different craft activities such as making jellyfish using paper plates and designing our own rainbow fish.

#### Foxes

Recently in Foxes we have been exploring growing, alongside sharing the stories 'Jasper's Beanstalk' and 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. The children have planted beans, discussed what plants need to grow and how they grow from a seed to a fully grown plant. We have also planted sunflower seeds and, inspired by Vincent Van Gogh, created observational paintings of sunflowers by looking carefully at the colour of the stem and petals of the flower. The children have used blocks to create their own beanstalks, challenging themselves to make taller and shorter beanstalks.





### Hedgehog

Hedgehog Class have had a great half term exploring our topic 'Come Outside'. At the start of the half-term, Miss Coston discovered a very strange looking bug in her garden! She showed the children a photo of it and they carried out research on minibeasts to try and work out what it was! Then, we learned the story 'The Very Ugly Bug', and the children had a go at designing their own insects. The children came up with excellent ideas for their bugs such as giving them huge googly eyes, sharp teeth and lots more! In our woodland explorer sessions, we had so much fun looking for real bugs using magnifying glasses and other nature detective equipment. To finish the topic, children wrote their own stories of 'The Very Ugly Bug'.

## Qw

This half term in Owl Class, we have welcomed our new class chicks. We started by putting some eggs into an incubator which then took twenty one days to hatch. We made a home for the chicks using saw dust and a special heat lamp to keep them warm. On the nineteenth day, we saw little cracks and watched two chicks arrive! Overnight, a further five arrived too. We had to wait until the chicks were all fluffy for them to then be taken out of the incubator and into their new home. The children have been very careful with the chicks and made sure they are always looked after. At the end of the half term, the chicks will go back to a farm to grow up with other chickens.



#### Key Stage 1



## **Dolphin**

Dolphin Class have had lots of fun this half term being Nature Explorers. We have loved learning about plants and watching our seeds grow. Topping them up with water and observing their changes has been a fun daily activity. Reading explanations texts in English has allowed us to learn about the life cycle of different creatures. It was great going out to the pond in the wildlife area to spot signs of frog life. Our art lessons have been a great opportunity for us to develop our painting techniques and explore primary and secondary colours, which we used to create abstract art inspired by Mondrian.

## Seahorse

Our highlight this term has been our weekly Art lessons where we learnt about painting. To start our learning we experimented with different brush strokes and learnt about primary colours and how to mix them to make secondary colours. We then learnt how to make colours lighter or darker by either adding white or black. To end our topic we created pieces of abstract art based upon the artist Piet Mondrian. Our artwork looked fantastic and is proudly displayed in our classroom.





## Penguin

What another exciting term it has been in Penguin Class. The children have fully immersed themselves in our History topic and been great 'History Detectives' by investigating the lives of Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole. In Mathematics, we have worked on money and fractions and the children have been fantastic in both of these tricky concepts. In English, we looked at a film clip called 'Zahra' and the children had to write detailed expanded noun phrases to describe the setting and character in this beautiful desert-inspired film. Finally, the children have loved their first few 'Woodland Explorer' sessions and have enjoyed role playing and being creative in our woodland area.

### Polar Bear

Polar Bear Class loved travelling back in time in our 'History Detectives' topic to find out about the life and work of two significant people: Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole. In Mathematics, we immersed ourselves in learning about money and fractions. We had fun in Art exploring clay, learning the different techniques, such as rolling, pinching, squeezing and twisting, and then planning, making and evaluating our own clay animal. We have really enjoyed being outside for our woodland explorer sessions too!



#### **Middle Years**

### Macaw



Macaw Class have had a busy term with their Design and Technology topic, learning all about levers and linkages. In Mathematics, they have been reasoning multiplicatively making connections between multiplication and division and using their resources to represent the different division structures. As scientists, the children have also been investigating light and dark.

### Toucan

Toucan Class have had an incredibly busy half term, they have developed their multiplication and division skills in Mathematics. In English, the children began by writing fantastic narratives based on 'Thesus and the Minotaur' and have begun a poetry unit based on 'The Colour Collector'. During Science lessons, they have explored and experimented with light. Finally, Toucan Class got creative in Design and Technology by making and designing their own ships. They included moving flags by using levers and linkages.





## Falcon

Falcon Class have been working hard this term on our topic 'Across the Atlantic'. We enjoyed finding out more about our local area and California. Our artwork has been based around the natural world. We sketched leaves and then used our drawing knowledge to design our own 'Green Man' based on local mythology. We also learnt about the artist Andy Goldsworthy and made our own environmental art. We have also been working hard in English and have written journey stories about an animal travelling from North America to London. We used the story 'Zeraffa Giraffa' to inspire our writing. In Mathematics we have continued to work hard on fractions including solving problems with mixed numbers and improper fractions.

### Kestrel

Kestrel Class have had a very busy half term! We have written journey stories in English, using adventurous words to add interest to descriptions. In addition, we have been learning how to write a review. In Mathematics, we have continued to develop our skills by working on converting mixed numbers and improper fractions. We have continued to learn about electricity in Science. During Art, we have used pencil drawing and shading techniques to produce work on the theme of nature. In Physical Education, we have been developing skills in tennis and practiced running, throwing and jumping in our athletics lessons.



#### Later Years



## Giraffe

During English, Giraffe Class have written their own mystery stories and newspaper reports. In French, we have learnt the names of different items of clothing and said which items we wear. In History, we have learnt all about the Ancient Egyptians. In Science, we have completed lots of science experiments. It has been a busy, but fun, half term.

## Zebra

Spring term has been a hugely successful and enjoyable term for both Zebra Class and Mr Evans. We have welcomed new arrivals, prepared and performed our class assembly and continue to make excellent progress in all subjects. Members of Zebra Class are taking on more and more roles of responsibility and leadership both in the classroom and across the school, helping to keep the school clean, supporting KS1 on the playground, working on the garden and much more!





### Jaguar

This term has been full on in Jaguar Class! In English, we have been focusing on improving our writing by using a wide range of punctuation, sentence openers and cohesive devices. The children have worked hard to publish three pieces of writing this term: an adventure narrative set in The Amazon, which involves finding a mysterious den; a balanced argument about whether or not the heron graffiti should be banned; and finally, a set of instruction about how to make some 'delicious' brownies! The children should be incredibly proud of themselves with how much effort they have put in, Well done!

### Panther

We have made it through half of the summer term and it has definitely been busy! The most unforgettable part of the term has almost certainly been the SATs tests, which we have had in the back of our minds since September. Our revision sessions, as seen in the picture, have helped us to better understand the process before facing the tests themselves. Our students have taken these challenges in their stride by pushing through, even when feeling the pressure. We are all incredibly proud of the work they have put in to prepare themselves. They have truly earned their break!



#### Friendship Games

On Tuesday 1st May, ten children from Year 2 attended the Friendship Games at Coleridge Community College. They took part in a range of activities including running, throwing, jumping and climbing. Everyone had a fabulous time and enjoyed learning new skills. They worked hard to improve on their scores and were very successful. Well done to all who attended!

Children need plain black shorts, a white t-shirt and plimsolls/trainers. Depending on the weather, children will also need a tracksuit and trainers for outdoor games lessons. Children will continue to arrive in their PE kits, when it is their PE day.

Jewellery

Jewellery may not be worn in school. The only exceptions are watches, studs for pierced ears, and cultural or religious adornments, which must be removed during lessons involving physical exercise. If such items cannot be removed the individual is not prepared in an acceptably safe way and cannot continue as is, so must take part in modified activity. The school will not accept responsibility for removing or storing studs. Long hair should be tied back for PE and DT activities.



If your financial circumstances have been affected by the COVID 19 crisis you could now be entitled to Benefit Related Free School Meals (FSM). Not only will this provide an allocation of £2.50 per day towards food and drink at school, it also allows the school to benefit from additional funding for a period of up to five years.

#### Am I eligible?

#### You are eligible for this if you are receiving any of:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (unless you're also entitled to Working Tax Credit, and earn no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for 4 weeks after you stop receiving Working Tax Credit)
- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400)






where you will receive an instant response as to your eligibility status. If you are eligible for FSM your child's school will be informed within 3 days.


