My assemblies this half term have focused upon setting personal goals for 2023, where children have been encouraged to think about the foundations they will need in order to be successful. From our '7 habits', we know that 'sharpening the saw' can mean looking after our physical well-being and that by doing this, we increase our chances of achieving our goals. In particular, we have looked at healthy eating habits, the importance of getting a good night of sleep and looking after our mental health. We learned how things such as brainteasers, Sudoku puzzles, word searches and crosswords could all help us to exercise our brains away from screens. Can you solve these brainteasers? I hope that your children can share the answers with you!





Our online safety day for children and parents enabled us to help our community to learn and understand more about how to adapt and support children and families to engage in safe online activities. We were fortunate enough to have secured the '2 John's', ex-police officers and experts in this field, to come and work with our classes and to hold an online meeting for parents and staff alike. The theme for this day was 'Want to talk about it?' which was designed to encourage time and space for conversations about life online. It certainly is a fact that the digital and online world is here to stay and we use it productively to learn tips around keeping personal details secure, managing difficult situations online, setting up safe controls and demonstrating good online conduct.

On a health and safety note, your children may have told you about a very successful 'invacuation drill' that we carried out at Queen Emma at the start of the term. This was to ensure that the children knew what to do in the event that they needed to move into classrooms and away from a threat outside of the school grounds. The example we used was a rogue dog on the loose. The children were extremely successful at this and proved themselves to be just as good at invacuation as evacuation.

Anthony Browne (MP) visited Queen Emma again this term, this time to meet with our House Captains who interviewed him about his role and his priorities for the future. The House Captains prepared questions for him such as 'What is your proudest achievement?', 'Who are you inspired by?' and 'How do you feel when you go into the House of Commons?' amongst others. The children found their discussion with him very insightful and they even obtained a personal copy of his signature to keep! Myself and our Chair of Governors also took this opportunity to discuss important community issues with him such as parking outside of school grounds, the consultation on the congestion charge and its impact, as well as support for Ukrainian families. We are grateful for the time that Mr Browne was able to spend with us.

With regard to the recent industrial action by teaching staff, I would like to say 'thank you' for supporting us. Please be advised that the next round of strikes are due to take place on 1st March and we will notify you in due course of the school's position. Once again, we may not be able to provide you with much notice about which classes will be open or not, but we will endeavor to notify you when we can. Your patience is appreciated.

We hope that you have an enjoyable half term and look forward to seeing the children back in school on **Monday 20th February 2023**.

Attendance really does matter

I am sure you will have seen many messages over the years, from teachers and headteachers and even from ministers, all stressing the importance of regular school attendance. You may also have seen recent news reports suggesting that school attendance has still not fully recovered from the effects of lockdown. Attendance is so important – much more than many people might realise – that it is worth stressing it in a special message here.

There has been a lot of research work into the impact of absence from school on children's progress and the results are striking. Firstly, the sheer number of lessons affected by a few days off school is surprisingly high. If there are five lessons in each day, which is quite a lot for your child to catch up on even after a single day off: a few days here and there can soon add up to twenty days, the equivalent of two weeks off school - or *fifty* lessons lost. That is a lot of catching-up work on top of the work your child is already doing in class.

We know from educational research from some years now, poor attendance can have a drastic effect on children's academic achievement. Not only do children find the work harder, because they have missed the teacher's explanations or the foundation work, but, precisely because they find it harder, they can easily lose motivation with school as a whole.

So please do take attendance seriously. School isn't an option for our children: we need to do all we can to help them get to school and make the most of their time here.

Punctuality matters too

Getting to school late might seem rather different from being absent: after all, your child is in school and you might think that surely a few minutes right at the start of the day, when the day has hardly got going, won't really matter? But it does.

This is partly because those five, ten or even fifteen or thirty minutes missed each day can also mount up to a substantial time lost. Ten minutes late per day, for example, adds up to a week of schooling lost. The start of the school day, with its set routines and procedures, is really important for children: they settle into learning mode, it helps each class develop its group identity and it sets up the day for learning and activity. Just as the start of the school day matters, so, therefore, does lateness. Anyone can find it difficult sometimes to get everyone ready in the morning, and sometimes lateness can be because of factors beyond our control - but not always. So please, do help us all to instil good habits in our children, to come to school regularly, on time, and ready to learn.

Nursery and Reception



Cubs

This term Cubs children have been reading the story of 'The Three Little Pigs.' The children have made pig and wolf masks and built houses from wooden blocks, sticks and straw. The children have really enjoyed this story and are amazing at retelling the story using actions and phrases such as, "I'll huff and I'll puff" and "Not by the hair on my chinny chin chin." The children have been using different voices to represent the wolf and the pigs – a deep voice for the wolf and a squeaky voice for the pigs.

Foxes

This half term in Foxes we have learned about changes in our environment during winter time, enjoying walks in the school grounds looking for bare trees, evergreens, frost and berries. We focused on hibernating animals, and in PE have acted out collecting nuts and settling down for a deep sleep. We read 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt', joining in with repeated phrases with actions and thinking about our senses of smell, sight, hearing and touch to describe the differing environments. We have also had fun celebrating Lunar New Year and creating decorations for the classroom, as well as making a fabulous lion head to use in our lion dances!





Hedgehog

Hedgehog Class have been looking at celebrations. We celebrated Chinese New Year through a range of different activities. We started by having a carousel day of activities, making rabbit headbands, Chinese lanterns and practicing our Chinese writing. We also had a parent come in to talk to the children about how they celebrate Chinese New Year within their own home. At the end of our day we shared our Chinese New Year creations with our parents in a parade. The children showed their artwork, performed a Chinese dance and were then surprised with a special Chinese dance from our school Chinese Dragon.

Owl

This half term Owl Class have been learning about the Snow Queen story. We have been thinking about melting and freezing. We have explored frozen ice and talked about how it is frozen and what we could use to melt it. During this, we made apple sorbet and rice crispy cakes looking how different recipes use freezing and melting. We also explored different animals in the Antarctic and Artic, thinking about their body adaptations for the cold. We learnt a new word which was 'equator' and talked about how countries far away from the equator are cold. At the end of our sessions, we innovated our Snow Queen story. Instead of using her friend the sun to melt the ice, we used a hairdryer! The children loved rewriting and illustrating their new story.



Key Stage 1



Dolphin

We have had such a busy half term diving under the sea! In English, we written an alternative middle for 'The Secret of Black Rock'. We loved pretending to dive into the ocean and describing the amazing creatures that we could see under the sea. In art, we created collages inspired by the artists Henri Matisse and Benode Behari Mukherjee. Thank you for your ongoing support and we look forward to another fun filled half term.

Seahorse

We have learnt so much this half-term about 'Under the Sea'! In Art we spent a whole day making collages using different materials to create under the sea pictures. We took lots of care to add lots of detail and they look fantastic up in our classroom. In Science, we have found out about the different animal groups: we are now experts on fish and mammals. Exploring new stories in English fired our imaginations. We loved 'The Secret of Black Rock' and had fun acting it out and writing descriptions using amazing adjectives. We are looking forward to our 'Castles' topic next half-term!



Penguin



Penguin Class have had a very busy half term learning about multiplication in Mathematics and writing an alternative fairy tale in English. They have been reading a new version of Hansel and Gretal in guided reading and used their inference skills to answer questions. Penguin Class have been studying human and physical features in Geography and drawing map symbols. The children have enjoyed Design and Technology, investigating structures such as bridges and then designing and making a strong bridge for the Three Billy Goats Gruff to use.

Polar Bear

Polar Bear Class have enjoyed our 'Once Upon a Time' topic. In English, we created alternative versions of 'Little Red Reading Hood'. We also wrote winter poems based on our senses and published a class book to share. In Mathematics, we focused on multiplication and solved a range of problems. We had fun in Geography using map skills and learning how to interpret the symbols in the key. In Design and Technology we helped the Three Billy Goats to reach the lush grass by designing and making bridges out of a variety of materials. We have been very busy!



Middle Years



Macaw

Macaw Class have had a busy term using their geography skills when learning all about Crete and comparing it to Cambridgeshire. They used their science learning on rocks and soils from last term to help them write fantastic explanation texts about the world that goes on beneath our feet! They also worked incredibly hard in learning their lines for their fabulous class assembly.

Toucan

Toucan Class have enjoyed writing their explanation text on soil layers and rock types. In Mathematics, we have enjoyed learning about mass and capacity. We have measured, poured, estimated, added together and taken away amounts. In Art, we have loved designing and making our own printing blocks to create a printing pattern. It has been a busy half term!



Falcon



This half term Falcon Class have been working hard on their English with our new narrative unit based on the book 'Farther' by Grahame Baker-Smith. We have learnt lots of new vocabulary to use and explored metaphors and similes in our work. We have used complex sentences with subordinating conjunctions and found words connected to the character's feelings in the book. In Art we have been using watercolours and have been fortunate enough to have our own expert, Mr Hart come in to school to share his knowledge of watercolour painting. We have learnt to use different techniques such as wet on wet and graduated washes in our seascape pictures.

Kestrel

Kestrel Class have enjoyed learning about the distributive law in Mathematics. They have used this to solve problems quickly such as $4 \times 7 + 2 \times 7$. We have been working hard to learn our times tables so we are ready for our end of year national test. In Geography we became cartographers and made our own maps of the local area around school. We identified the different types of land use such as recreational, housing, retail, transport etc and labelled these uses on our maps. We have also looked at photographs from around Cambridge and compared what the land is used for now from what it was used for many years ago. In PE we have been learning about balance and different ways of travelling in gymnastics.



Later Years



Giraffe

We have reached the end of our first spring half term in Year 5 with great focus and success. In Science we have focussed on 'Living Things and their Habitats'. The children have learnt about how plants reproduce, through both science experiments and plant dissection. In PSHCE we have discussed citizenship and diversity, it has been fantastic learning more about members of the class through the presentation of their 'About Me Box'. Giraffe Class truly have creative imaginations!

Zebra

Zebra Class have had a fun and busy half term! In our English lessons we have been working on a project called 'The Write Stuff', which supports and challenges us to use complex sentences and powerful vocabulary to create exciting imagery. We have really enjoyed writing stories about a child creating adventures with a magic crayon! In Mathematics we have been focusing on scaling, including multiplying by a fraction to scale amounts down. We definitely needed our times table facts to help us to do this efficiently. The children have enjoyed using IT to complete some 3D modelling challenges, and our final 'Design Packaging' project enabled us to apply these skills alongside unleashing our creativity.





Jaguar

While we have completed many activities in this incredibly short half term, one of the more memorable activities was an opportunity away from the classroom environment. The Year 6's were invited to the Cambridge Corn Exchange to take part in a workshop run by Michael Rosen. He began the activity by performing some of his more memorable poems (No Breathing in Class!) followed by storytelling about his family during WWII; a topic familiar to our classes. Finally, we were able to write and share some ideas for poems we created on the spot. Very exciting!

Panther

With our topic of South America this half term, we have had many opportunities to hone our online research skills. We have used safe online sites to look for information about regions and ecosystems of South America, as well as understanding human and physical geography within. By comparing these ideas to our own local area, we have been able to appreciate how different our environments really are! Well done to all; we have worked incredibly hard this term, and have truly earned our break.

School Uniform

Grey skirt, pinafore, trousers or shorts

Blue and white checked summer dress

Royal blue sweatshirt or cardigan

Pale blue polo shirt

Black shoes or black trainers (children in Years 5 and 6 require a pair of black indoor shoes (often plimsolls)

White, black or grey socks / tights

Leggings may be worn instead of tights, but not instead of trousers

No jeans please.

PE Kit

Children need plain black shorts, a white t-shirt and plimsolls/trainers. Depending on the weather, children will also need a tracksuit and trainers for outdoor games lessons. Children will continue to arrive in their PE kits, when it is their PE day.

Jewellery

Jewellery may not be worn in school. The only exceptions are watches, studs for pierced ears, and cultural or religious adornments, which must be removed during lessons involving physical exercise. If such items cannot be removed the individual is not prepared in an acceptably safe way and cannot continue as is, so must take part in modified activity. The school will not accept responsibility for removing or storing studs. Long hair should be tied back for PE and DT activities.


"It was really fun and challenging as well. My favourite was the 'Pairs of Cards' game." Alice


"It was great to go to the Corn Exchange and listen to Michael Rosen perform his poems. He shared lots of fantastic ideas with us."


Spinning Wheel Theatre say it will be a joyful and uplifting tale of magic, friendship and hope, a show that we are sure the children will love.




Book Week 2023





















At the start of this year, on our training day in January, we shared the following information with our teachers. They were amazed at the difference reading makes to the number of words a child will have heard by the time they are five years old.

Here's how many words kids would have heard by the time they were 5 years old: Never read to, 4,662 words; 1–2 times per week, 63,570 words; 3–5 times per week, 169,520 words; daily, 296,660 words; and five books a day, 1,483,300 words.¹⁶
