She supported the children with a series of workshops aimed at demonstrating how they could create atmosphere and tension within their storylines. Here you are able to see her providing some motivational teaching.

#### **Cycles, Scooters and Dogs**

For the safety of everyone, please be reminded that cycles and scooters should be dismounted on school premises. It is also the case that dogs are not permitted on the school site.

#### **School Uniform**

Grey skirt, pinafore, trousers or shorts

Blue and white checked summer dress

Royal blue sweatshirt or cardigan

Pale blue polo shirt

Black shoes or black trainers (children in Years 5 and 6 require a pair of black indoor shoes (often plimsolls)

White, black or grey socks / tights

Leggings may be worn instead of tights, but not instead of trousers

#### **PE Kit**

Children need plain black shorts, a white t-shirt and plimsolls/trainers. Depending on the weather, children will also need a tracksuit and trainers for outdoor games lessons. Children will continue to arrive in their PE kits, when it is their PE day.

#### **Jewellery**

Jewellery may not be worn in school. The only exceptions are watches, studs for pierced ears, and cultural or religious adornments, which must be removed during lessons involving physical exercise. If such items cannot be removed the individual is not prepared in an acceptably safe way and cannot continue as is, so must take part in modified activity. The school will not accept responsibility for removing or storing studs.

### **Nursery & Reception**





# Cubs

The Cubs Room children have really enjoyed reading the story 'Jack and the Beanstalk' and 'Jaspers Beanstalk'. In particular they enjoyed planting seeds, watering them and watching them grow. We are now experts at retelling the story and changing our voices to become different characters.

### Foxes

This half term in Foxes we have enjoyed the popular stories of 'The Runaway Pancake' and 'The Gingerbread Man,' acting these out and joining in with repeated refrains. We have learnt about life cycles and how these follow cyclical patterns, looking at caterpillars to butterflies, eggs to crocodiles and eggs to chickens. Our walks during Woodland Wednesday and Forest Friday have encouraged the children to look for signs of spring, to collect a variety of natural objects and to make stick and wool caterpillars and bird feeders. We have also focused on some 2D and 3D shapes, thinking about their properties and joining them to make new pictures and models. The oval shape has been developed during our move towards Easter - printing eggs, modelling them with added sequins and beads, designing patterns on them and hunting for egg-shaped pictures in our nursery garden!





# Hedgehog

This half term, the children in Reception have enjoyed a range of celebrations. We had a special week celebrating Mother's Day! The children made their own cards by carefully doing observational drawings of daffodils to go on the front of them, using oil pastels. They then used their understanding of phonics to write heartfelt messages to their loved ones. The children then worked together to make delicious scones and invited their mums into school to share the scones with them! We have also enjoyed learning about Easter and the children attended a special assembly all about it! The children learnt about why Christians celebrate Easter and loved watching the puppets!

# **Owl**

This half term in Owl Class we have been learning about traditional tales such as Red Riding Hood and Goldilocks. We have used clues to work out which traditional tale we would be focusing on each week. We have learnt about the big bad wolf from lots of different stories like Mr Wolf's Pancakes and Little Red Riding Hood. We have learnt actions to each of our traditional tales, made props and acted each of the stories out. Most recently, we have looked at the Three Little Pigs story. We talked about what made the brick house strong so the wolf could not blow it down. The children were very keen to talk about cement and how this was our glue to hold the house together! We then designed and labelled our own houses and used these to help us create our own houses which would be safe for the pigs to live in.







# Dolphin

We have had such a busy half term! We kick-started the term with our 'Castles Day', where we were transported back into the reign of King Stephen. We loved helping the King by making many different items to keep our castle safe and secure. In Design and Technology, we have been busy getting creative, making our own castles with a lever or slider mechanism. It has been a wonderful topic and we look forward to another new and exciting adventure next term!

# Seahorse

'Castles' has been a fantastic topic! We have learnt so much about these amazing buildings such as the four different types of castles, their features and who may have worked there including what their lives may have been like. The highlight of this term was definitely our 'Castles Day' where 'History off the Page' came in and immersed us in a medieval castle. We made lots of different crafts such as soaps, grotesques and wax candles. In the afternoon the hall was transformed into a medieval banquet where the children were grouped into either royalty, performers or servants. We then feasted on bread, cheese, fruit and even blackcurrant wine! The children had a fantastic day and learnt so much going back in time.





# Penguin

Penguin Class have had a very busy and enjoyable half term. One of the highlights was the class assembly 'Penguin Class Have Got Talent' which was thoroughly enjoyed by the children and the adults that watched. The children worked hard on the topic' Fire, Fire', taking on the role of Samuel Pepys and acting out the story of the fire in groups. We had amazing dance lessons where the children composed a dance about the Great Fire and performed it with gusto!

# Polar Bear

Polar Bear Class really enjoyed our 'Fire, Fire!' topic which involved travelling back in time in History to 1666 to learn how and why the Great Fire of London spread and who the significant people of the time were. In English, we wrote diary extracts as if we were at the Great Fire of London! In Mathematics, we consolidated our learning on division, explored 2D and 3D shapes and learnt to add two-digit numbers. We especially enjoyed creating 3D 'Skeleton Shapes' in Mathematics using straws and modelling clay. PE was fun too, creating a dance to represent the Great Fire of London. We have been busy achieving our class WIG 'to focus and be independent'!



### Middle Years






## Macaw

Macaw Class have had a busy term with their history topic, learning all about the Ancient Greeks and how they still influence our lives today. The Ancient Greek day was a fantastic experience for them all. They have also enjoyed rehearsing for their Middle Years production and what a fabulous performance they gave!

## Toucan

Toucan Class have enjoyed writing their Greek Myth this half term. Within our Greek theme, the class have enjoyed their Greek Day, trying some Greek food in Design and Technology, learning about the Gods and Goddesses and what life was like in Ancient Greece. During Mathematics, we have been consolidating our understanding on using number lines for subtraction and using the column method.



# Falcon



This half term we have been busy learning all about climate, biomes and ecosystems as part of our topic 'Race to the Pole'. We wrote diary entries in English as if we were someone in Shackleton's expedition. We added our feelings at different points in the diary entry and thought about how our feelings would change during the journey. We had an interesting session with the Scott Polar Museum where we found out lots about what it was like to be an Antarctic explorer during the time of the first explorations. We have also had a huge focus this term on our performance of 'Wiz Wam Alakazam' and the children have been amazing at learning their lines and the songs in the performance.

# Kestrel

We have been getting to know each other in Kestrel Class and it's been a super half term doing so! In Literacy, our 'Race to the Pole' topic has taken us on an imaginary expedition with the great Shackleton himself. We were also lucky enough to have the opportunity to interview him over Zoom! We have been busy learning about different climate zones and biomes around the world. Our focus in Mathematics has been learning to calculate the perimeter and area of given shapes. Without a doubt, the highlight of the half term has been the 'Wiz Wam, Alakazam' production – it has been an absolute joy and the children have worked really hard! Well done Kestrel Class! Enjoy the Easter holidays with your families.



### **Later Years**





### Giraffe

We have reached the end of the spring half term in Year 5 with great focus and success. In Science, we have focussed on 'Animals, including Humans'. The children have learnt about lifecycles, gestational periods and life expectancy. In PSHE, we have discussed managing our emotions. We have travelled to Antarctica in English, learning facts about emperor penguins to support our writing of a non-chronological text. We have continued to develop our guided reading skills with the text: 'Journey to the River Sea'. In Mathematics, we have used our times table knowledge to calculate volume, cubed numbers and three-factor multiplication.

### Zebra

Zebra Class have had a busy half term and enjoyed a wide range of experiences. We studied the extraordinary lives of Emperor Penguins as part of our writing project, and learnt how to select effective vocabulary and grammatical structures when writing reports about them. We completed our studies of mountains and rivers, culminating in researching, designing and building free-standing structures to build tents for mountaineers! In music we have had fun learning how to generate beats and rhythms, using their bodies as percussion instruments! One of the highlights of the term was our book week, with the children getting involved in a range of fun and exciting activities, including a 'mystery reader' session.



# Jaguar




While Science is always a fascinating subject, this term saw a focus on 'living things,' including microorganisms. We studied some examples before growing some of own with amazing results. Our vision was to observe microorganisms develop, and investigate similarities and differences in characteristics. Using our different variables, we were able to write about the investigation clearly using a scientific method, showing how these living things developed over a period of time. They are still tucked in the classroom to have a final check at the beginning of next half term. Something to look forward to!

## Panther

As the term draws to a close, we have been fortunate enough to have Active Science in every week to help guide us through some elements of health, physical fitness and how our body works. In each new week, we were able to study a different aspect to health, and then use investigations to demonstrate these ideas practically. This will fit well in the upcoming term as we further challenge ourselves to understand healthy lifestyles, and ways to improve them. Thank you again to Cambridge United who have provided us with an exceptional foundation for the upcoming term.

### **Book Week Reading Challenge**

What an amazing response we received from our Book Week Reading Challenge! 180 children from across the school returned their completed forms to school this week, earning up to 2800 house points each for their house team (100 house points for each day of the reading challenge).
